A DAY AT CAMP

SUMMER STAFF

This amazing team is evidence of God's goodness and provision. From over 300 applications we invited 39 Spring Director and Coordinator staff, 47 Senior and Junior Cabin Leaders, 18 Teleios students, 127 Junior Support staff and 47 Adult Volunteers to share in the mission of SABC this summer. We walked together in prayer to create a fun faith building community that transformed lives and developed leadership.

A day at camp is an exhilarating and fast-paced experience filled with intentional activities that make every day unique. Whether it is splash campers going down the slip and slide, the fort campers hanging out and tubing on outtrip, or the volleyball campers getting reps in the gym, there is always something happening and often all at the same time. As we have many different camp combinations each week, it can be challenging to capture what a "typical" day looks like. That being said, here is a broad picture of what each day might hold:

Morning: Mornings kick off with a hearty breakfast to energize campers for the day ahead. After breakfast, campers engage in Clean Up The Cabin And Have Fun Doing It (CUTCAHFDI) where they not only keep their cabins tidy but also compete for points in cabin competitions. Simultaneously, there are up to three chapels happening using the 3:16 chapel, lakeview chapel, and the Fort. Before lunch, campers dive into their first activity.

Afternoon: Afternoons are all about activities and bonding with cabin mates. Campers can be seen conquering fears on the giant swing, exploring their creativity through ceramics, learning about mechanics while building disc shooters, or simply having fun at the beach. Campers also have their 'spoudazo' time for reflection and discussion related to the morning chapel sessions.

Evening: Evenings commence with a themed supper, setting the stage for the night's activities. A wide game involving all campers adds excitement to the evening. As the day winds down, campers attend a second chapel, followed by a campfire gathering. Campfire is a heartwarming conclusion to the day, filled with songs and cabin leaders sharing their testimonies.

Each day at camp brings unique challenges and blessings, and we're excited to make the most of every moment.





5 Year Plan

We are now going into our third year of a 5 year capital plan that was presented to the membership in 2021. The plan has 5 main priorities where investment is needed: Debt Repayment, Direct Camper Impact, Program Vibe, Site Improvements, and Vehicles and Equipment.

Debt Repayment

Last year the mortgage was fully paid for in part by using funds that were earmarked for operations. The hope is to replenish the operating fund with what was borrowed.

Direct Camper Impact

The desire is for campers to feel, touch and experience directly the benefit of this priority. In past years we have added wardrobes in the lodge rooms, upgraded the Lodgeside cabins with new doors, heaters, and floors, and added a boat lift which has helped our efficiency at the waterfront. Included this year is the Dock project that we continue to wait for authorization from the Alberta Government. Also, our Hillside cabins require new doors, floors and electric heaters.

Program Vibe

Showing excellence in our program is important to us. In the past couple of years we've added canoes/kayaks/paddleboards, laser tag, waterski equipment, and some ski boats. This year we would like to add hammocks, a commercial air hockey table, a TruBlue belay system for a crate stacking activity in the gym, a more permanent slip and slide, and some beach inflatables. A telethon is planned for March that will help raise funds needed to purchase these items.

Site Improvements

There is great pride taken by our operations staff as they steward this property and facilities. Last year we were able to renovate and finish the basement of our cook's house at the entrance to our property. This coming year the plan is to add irrigation capabilities for the Blenkin and Kehler yards, start a tree farm utilizing the sewage lagoon water, finish landscaping around the lodge and lakeside cabins, replace the waterfront boardwalk, and redo our campfire bleachers.

Vehicles and Equipment

There have been donors that have stepped forward to help in this area. There were 2 pickup trucks donated which has helped set our maintenance crew up for the foreseeable future. Our plan is still to replace our tractor with a newer, larger tractor more suited for our operation. There are some donors already committed but we have not completed this fundraising yet. We are hopeful for the coming months.

Work Being Done on Future Projects

Our staff have dreams to the moon and back for what we could add here at SABC. We are limited by funding, yes, but also by the amount of time our staff have to commit to projects. Still, work is being done for future projects that we will present at future AGMs. Our biggest and most exciting project is a zip line tour that we are aiming to have for 2025. We'll keep you posted!

Mark 12:29-31: "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no commandment greater than these." This verse echoed



the model of life that the students learned to live while they were here-loving God with all that they are. To help us teach this to the students, the sessions looked a little different this year. We wanted them to take ownership of their learning to make it their own. Why would a teaching change their lives if it wasn't something that they were even remotely interested in? So we let them ask the questions and then helped them find the answers themselves. God worked in some really cool ways this summer. We had a couple of baptisms, numerous immensely difficult yet completely life altering discussions, and an unbelievable testament from each student about the work that God had done in their lives this summer. God used Teleios in incredible ways this year.



The 10 month rental season at SABC has now exceeded pre-pandemic levels both fiscally and in rental day equivalencies (the number of people that use our site for meals and accommodations). Our facility was rented 200 out of 264 possible days in the 2022/23 rental season. Comparatively there were a total of 89 rental groups in the 2021/22 season and 110 groups for the 2022/23 season on par with our 2018/19 season at 109 groups but the size of the groups has increased. In addition to full high season months we have seen an increase in midweek rentals from February to April. Rental volume is a consistent challenge for our full time team to manage alongside all of their regular duties. We have recently hired some high school students to help our full time team host and are seeking to add qualified staff to our kitchen team in both casual and full time roles. I feel truly blessed to be working with excellent, industrious and efficient

staff on both our kitchen and janitorial teams.

PROPERTIES

This past year has been a packed one, full of repairs, projects and God's goodness.

On the grounds we have added parking at the Lakeside Cabin Circle, retaining walls and some much needed sod. Upkeep on buildings included a full renovation to the basement of one of our staff homes and interior renovations to the Lodgeside cabins including new doors, floors, heaters, paint and trim. We were especially blessed this year with an incredible amount of volunteering. The biggest change was the addition of some volunteer "snowbird" staff. The steady efforts of Jerry DeJong as well as Don and Myrna Bergen throughout the spring and summer made a huge difference in both work load and what could be accomplished. We are looking forward to them rejoining our team in the spring. Alongside these new resident volunteers our regular crew of supporters was hard at work as well. Many hundreds of hours went into projects, regular upkeep, wiring, metal projects and some incredible custom coffee tables. SABC would be lost without this committed crew of dedicated volunteers.

During the summer season we were blessed with a full grounds crew and had a great time teaching, playing and studying God's word together. What a blessing to watch God grow and stretch them.

God has been about his business at camp as usual and it has been a blessing to be a part of.
